Math concepts eluded this student until a teacher taught her how to think differently. A few years later, Olympia LePoint was hired as a rocket scientist. She now helps others pursue their life passions.

The Petroleum Museum, through the support of the **Abell-Hanger Foundation**, will welcome **Olympia LePoint**, who has been hailed as “the New Einstein” by fans, as she shares her amazing story at the **2018 Arlen Edgar Distinguished Lecture Series at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, September 25.**

Olympia LePoint is, literally, a rocket scientist whose remarkable story begins with her admission that she failed math and science until the 11th grade. A math teacher took her under her wing and taught her how to perceive her own intelligence and think differently. Ultimately, she graduated at the top of her class from California State University, Northridge and was hired by Boeing three months after graduating, at the age of 21 - the youngest scientist in the company. Her job was to calculate the probability of catastrophic explosions in space flights.

As an internationally-recognized leader in both math and science fields, LePoint helped launch NASA's Endeavour, Discovery, Columbia, and Atlantis space shuttles. With her experience launching 28 missions into Space, LePoint won numerous awards including the “Boeing Professional Excellence Award” and “Engineer of the Year, Modern Day Technology Leader Award.” From the ages of 21-30, LePoint was one of the youngest leaders to help launch NASA's Space Shuttle to success.

LePoint holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mathematics and a Master of Science Degree in Applied Mathematics as a notable alumna from California State University, Northridge. Upheld as “The Brainpower Expert,” Olympia is currently applying her mathematical skills to calculate the ways in which humans can actually “remap” their minds to reprogram their thinking and is sharing those findings in keynote speeches, workshops, and college lectures. She combines science with trailblazing faith to help leaders use self-directed neuroplasticity to rise to great NASA feats. As a CEO of OL Consulting Corporation – a book publishing and educational media production company – Olympia LePoint has channeled her passion into helping millions across the globe to overcome fear and pursue their life passions through the internet by establishing the Olympia LePoint Science Scholarship to help promote formal university education.

Hall of Fame Deadline

Nominations for candidates to be inducted into the prestigious Petroleum Hall of Fame will be accepted until September 1, 2018.

The Hall of Fame Committee will consider nominees based on the following criteria:

- Candidate should have made outstanding contributions to the development of the petroleum industry.
- A candidate may be living or deceased.
- Neither wealth nor the absence of wealth will be considered as factors in an election.
- A cover letter must include the name of the candidate and a clear statement as to why the candidate should be considered followed by a biographical sketch.

The next induction ceremony and dinner will be held May 2, 2019. "To be inducted into the Petroleum Museum Hall of Fame is an honor that is second to none in the oil and gas industry as only four persons or teams are elected by their peers every other year," said Richard Booth, President, Petroleum Museum Board of Trustees.

Kvasnicka: Grew Up in Industry

Since childhood, Sally Kvasnicka's life has revolved around the energy industry. Her father, a geologist with Conoco, moved the family to Midland in 1965, and then Sally grew up to work as a landman. She brought that extensive knowledge of the industry to the Petroleum Museum board in January 2017.

Ms. Kvasnicka attended Midland schools and then went to West Texas State University at Canyon to major in business. "There were three areas of business – marketing, business, and management. I knew I wanted to be a landman," she said and selected the marketing category. After graduation, she started her career with Texas Oil & Gas in 1980 and worked there four years. Then came a couple of years as a stay-at-home mom, meanwhile doing some contract land work. In May 1987, she joined Fasken Oil & Ranch where she works today. "It's an incredible place to work," she noted.

As a Girl Scout, she grew up learning the "mindset that you need to pay it back and do volunteer work in the community." Ms. Kvasnicka had already served on several boards of non-profit organizations when she was invited to add the Petroleum Museum board to her list. She said "yes!"

"The Petroleum Museum reaches out to all children and adults with their programs. They bring in great speakers. It's amazing that they have the Chaparral cars, the mineral exhibits and the Tom Lovell paintings. This is a well-rounded museum and it's a wonderful facility for our community.

"The museum helps explain the petroleum industry to visitors, the usage of hydrocarbons and how it's done responsibly. It's a great advocate for our industry," she said.

Harper Map Predicted Oil in the Permian

One of the items on display in the Museum's "Birth of an Industry" gallery is the Red Bed Map, drawn in 1924 by geologist Oliver C. "Kip" Harper. It is deemed one of the most significant pieces of geological evaluation ever completed in the United States, as it indicated a vast area of West Texas was likely to produce oil. The red beds covered the Permian strata throughout the center of the Permian Basin, thinning across the Central Basin Platform and thickening into the Midland and Delaware Basins.

In 1922 Harper went to work for Gulf Production Company in Sweetwater. At that time there was little production in the Westbrook Field of Mitchell County. The sub-surface configuration of the Permian Basin was almost entirely unknown, and it remained so even after the Santa Rita discovery at Texon in 1923.

The Red Bed Map delineates the Central Basin Platform. Using what was learned from the Santa Rita field, together with a scattering of dry holes Gulf had drilled, scattered outcrops, and water wells, Harper and a colleague, Ernest Closuit, began attempting to solve the Basin's geological mysteries. It was Harper who put the finishing touches on the isopach map which illustrates Triassic red beds.

Many oil fields, with a total yield in the hundreds of millions of barrels, have resulted from this breakthrough. Later, as an independent, O. C. Harper continued to learn more about the earth and to test his beliefs. He was responsible for the Harper and Foster fields, for interesting Amon Carter in drilling the Wasson Field discovery well, and for at least six other field discoveries. He is among the line of geologists turned independent who learned from their failures and helped make the Basin one of the premier oil provinces in the world. Harper was inducted into the Permian Basin Petroleum Hall of Fame in 1972 for his outstanding contributions to the development of the petroleum industry.

Museum Provides Home for Giant Dino Bone

The Petroleum Museum is proud to partner with the Midland Gem and Mineral Society to provide a temporary home for an amazing specimen. This incredible giant leg bone is believed to be from a Titanosaurus, a plant-eating, long-necked sauropod dinosaur that lived 145-65 million years ago. Titanosaurs are one of the largest dinosaurs discovered to date, weighing in at over 70 tons.

On loan from the Midland Gem and Mineral Society, it is featured in the Museum's Mineral Gallery. The fossil, one of the largest fossils found in the Big Bend area, was discovered on a private ranch near Lajitas in 1997. Bill Waller, Earl Pflughoeft, and Trent Brown, pictured in the photograph found the specimen in 1997, but because of weather, had to return in 1998 to retrieve the huge fossil.

New Digs: *Bearded Dragon Enjoys Upgrade*

Pogona are a genus of lizards containing seven species, which are often known by the common name "Bearded Dragons." This term is most commonly used to describe the Central Bearded Dragon. Bearded Dragons are native to the central Australian desert, where food is often scarce. They are adept climbers, spending time on branches and in bushes, even found on fence posts when living near human habitation. They are omnivorous, capable of subsisting on a wide variety of food sources.

How is bitumen connected with mummies?



Bitumen, pronounced "by-TOO-men", is a black, oily, viscous form of petroleum, a naturally-occurring organic byproduct of decomposed plants. This remarkable waterproof and flammable natural substance has been used for a wide variety of tasks for at least the past 40,000 years. The ancient Egyptians began to use bitumen for embalming mummies during the Twelfth Dynasty (1991-1802 B.C). Medieval Arab physicians used bitumen/asphalt both as a salve for cuts, bruises, and bone fractures, and as an internal medicine for stomach ulcers and tuberculosis. They achieved the best results with a black pissasphalt, similar to tar, that seeped from a mountain in Darabgerd, Persia. The

Greek physician Pedanius Dioscorides' c. 50-70 A.D. *De Materia Medica* ranked bitumen from the Dead Sea as medicinally superior to the pissasphalt from Apollonia (Illyria), both of which were considered to be an equivalent substitute for the scarce and expensive Persian mu-miyya. A number of processed types of bitumen are used in the modern world: paving streets and roofing houses, as well as additives to diesel or other gas oils.


