STE(A)Ming Ahead Into Fall

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) education is becoming a staple inside and out of the classroom for many reasons. The ever-growing STEM industry, as well as technological advances in our everyday lives, creates a great need for such education to be provided for the future minds of our society. The importance of STEM education goes further than filling gaps in STEM careers. Skills developed through STEMbased programming are critical for every aspect of students' lives. The 21st-century skills that are developed through STEM learning include media and technology literacy, creativity, critical thinking, communication, flexibility, problem solving, decision making, and more. To help provide students in the surrounding communities quality STEM-based programming, the Petroleum Museum offers a variety of programs that keep young minds engaged throughout the school year.

We will kick off the fall with our Building Bots Robotics & Engineering Funlabs for students in kindergarten through sixth grade. These classes are designed to engage students in collaborative engineering challenges, robotic design, and creative activities. The classes feature our LEGO WeDo 2.0 sets, LEGO Mindstorm EV3 sets, Ozobots, Osmos, Spheros, and new KUBO

robotics equipment. With different themes for each session, young engineers will love coming to every session! Sessions for students in kindergarten through second grade are held on the first Tuesdays of September, October, and November while sessions for students in third through sixth grade are held on the third Tuesdays of the same months. The cost is \$25 per session for Petroleum Museum members and \$30 per session for nonmembers. Pre-registration is required.

STEAM Sprouts is a hands-on, interactive program for children ages 4 & 5 that will feature six-week sessions held on Mondays from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. OR 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. beginning Monday, September 23. Each class will feature Fairy Tale STEAM programming that will include cooperative engineering tasks, social development, and creative activities. The cost is \$80 for Petroleum Museum members and \$100 for non-members. Pre-regis-Y Occidental tration is required. Hiebert Follows Ancient Trade Routes

Archaeologist and National Geographic Fellow **Dr. Fredrik Hiebert** has searched for human history in some of the world's most remote and romantic places and put them in context – in terms of conflict, history, and culture.

Hiebert, archaeologist-in-residence at the National Geographic Society, will talk on *Ancient Trade Route Archaeology* as the **Arlen Edgar Distinguished Lecturer** at 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 24, at the Museum. The event is sponsored by the **Abell-Hanger Foundation**.

Working on all seven continents of the world, Hiebert has traced ancient trade routes overland and across the seas for more than 30 years and brought great stories of archaeological discov-

ery to the pages of National Geographic for more than 15 years.



As a field archaeologist and explorer on the ancient Silk Road, he has excavated sites along this millennia-old link between Europe and East Asia. His excavations at a 4,000-year-old Silk Road city in Turkmenistan made headlines around the world. Following this most famous of trade routes led him to Afghanistan, where he identified the Bactrian gold, a trove of Silk Road-era artifacts lost during Afghanistan's decades of cultural upheaval. He also has searched for evidence of ancient submerged settlements in the highest lake of the Silk Road and in South America's Lake Titicaca.

As National Geographic's archaeologist-in-residence, he extends his enthusiasm for archaeology to the public in lectures, presentations, films, and museum exhibits.

ASK Dr. Petro What Is the Flame Shooting Into the Air?



One of the prominent features of oil refineries and petrochemical plants is a tall stack with a flame burning at the top. This stack, called a flare, is an essential part of the plant safety system which protects against the dangers of over-pressuring industrial plant equipment. Volatile hydro-

carbons form very explosive mixtures if mixed with air. As a safety precaution they are delivered by closed piping systems to the flare site where they may be burned in a controlled manner.

Rather than released into the atmosphere, flaring also occurs at wellheads to dispose of excess natural gases that are either unusable or uneconomical to recover during production. When petroleum crude oil is extracted and produced from oil wells, raw natural gas associated with the oil is brought to the surface as well. As the state's primary oil and gas regulatory

agency, the Texas Railroad Commission has jurisdiction over permitting of flaring operations to prevent waste of natural resources. Most flaring permit requests that the Commission



receives are for flaring casinghead gas. In new areas of exploration, pipeline connections are not typically constructed until after a well is completed and a determination is made about the well's productive capability.


