Expanding STEM Education

The Petroleum Museum has indeed become a "launching point" for STEM education for our community. The addition of highly technological exhibits in 2016 allowed the Museum to move more strongly into the areas of science and technology education. Robotics programs, STEM classes and Energy trunks all help students in our community to experience science in new and innovative ways. Programs like STEM Gems encourage junior high girls to explore the sciences.

With a vision to inspire an understanding of and a passion for science for visitors of all ages, the Petroleum Museum is embarking on its newest venture – the construction of a new STEM Education Center to be located on the Museum's grounds. This addition will provide much needed space for the Museum's growing education programs. The 3,000-square-foot building will house a larger education classroom, workspace for education staff, additional storage, and a "science" kitchen. The 5,000-square-foot covered patio will provide quality community outdoor space with seating, interactive exhibits and a garden featuring vegetables and native plants.

The \$6 million project will be an important addition to our community for both quality of life in the Permian Basin and as schools look for new ways to engage students in the sciences. We are very pleased and encouraged with a significant lead gift from the **FMH Foundation** and a significant gift from the **Wayne and JoAnn Moore Foundation** to kick off this endeavor. Financial advisor **Joe Liberty's** passion for the Petroleum Museum started a quarter century ago when he was asked to manage the facility's endowment fund. Recently, as a board member, he helped the museum in applying for and receiving the FMH Foundation \$1 million grant for a new STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Education Center.

The longtime Midlander is sandwiched between generations involved in the petroleum industry. His grandfather was a nitro shooter. Today, Liberty watches his three granddaughters working in the industry as engineers and in other technological fields.

"I believe that for us (United States) to be competitive in the future we have to turn out more engineers and, hopefully, more female engineers. I am amazed at the job my granddaughters are doing," he said. "I've had a historical love for the oil industry."

When the concept of expanding the Education Wing to focus on STEM was introduced, Liberty hopped on board with vocal and monetary support. He was part of the group that attended the FMH Foundation grant hearing and noted the executive director "was blown away we would take the time off to do that." The Foundation provided the lead gift of the campaign with a \$1 million grant.

Through its many programs for people of all ages, Liberty said the Museum performs an educational service for the community and beyond. "It shows the technological importance of engineers, geophysicists and others who make the energy business run correctly," he said. "One of my passions is to help them get that story out in the community more."

The new STEM Education Center will turn that passion into reality.

Meet Pepper, the French Lop Rabbit

Distinguished Lecturer: Dr. Fredrik Hiebert

Even though he has discovered valuable artifacts, Fred Hiebert is quick to note, "We don't actually search for treasure. We search for knowledge-that's our real gold."

Hiebert will be the Arlen Edgar Distinguished Lecturer at the Museum at 7 p.m. on September 24. This educational presentation is sponsored by the Abell-Hanger Foundation.



Enthusiastic about bringing educational experiences to the public, Hiebert's search for knowledge led him to research field archaeology, which has taken him all over the world. Hiebert defines geography as the ability to identify regions and put them in context - in terms of conflict, history, and culture. After earning a Ph.D. from Harvard University, he spent 10 years as professor at the University of Pennsylvania before joining the National Geographic Society as its archaeology fellow. Hiebert has searched for human history in

some of the world's most remote and romantic places. An expert on the ancient Silk Road, he has excavated sites along this millennium-old link between Europe and East Asia. Following this trade route led him to Afghanistan, where in 2004 he identified the Bactrian gold, a trove of Silk Road-era artifacts lost during Afghanistan's decades of cultural upheaval. He has played a key role in recovering that country's endangered cultural heritage, most recently by curating a traveling exhibition called "Afghanistan: Hidden Treasures From the National Museum, Kabul."

ASK Dr. Petro Pumpjacks. Pumping Units. What's the Difference?




Of the approximately one million oil and gas wells producing in the world, roughly 5 percent flow naturally - leaving most of the world's oil and gas production reliant on efficient artificial lift operations.

The West Texas landscape is dotted with an array of artificial lift devices. We commonly refer to all of these as pumpjacks. However, it was the mission of a dedicated longtime Museum volunteer, Ron Parks, to shed light on the difference between a pumpjack and a pumping unit.

In early days, pumpjacks worked by rod lines running horizontally above the ground to a wheel on a rotating wheel in a mechanism known as central power to which they were connected via rod lines. The central power, which might operate a dozen or more pumpjacks, would be powered by a steam or internal combustion engine or by an electric motor. Among the advantages of this layout was having one motor to power all the pumpjacks rather than individual motors for each. However, one of the many difficulties was maintaining system balance as individual well loads changed.

Modern conventional and beam-balanced pumping units are powered by a prime mover by using the optimal artificial lift method at each stage of production. This is commonly an electric motor, but internal combustion engines are used in isolated locations without access to electricity. Common offgrid pumping unit engines run on natural gas, often casing gas produced from the well, but many have been run on many types of fuel, such as propane

Archives Working with Bullock Museum on Exhibits



The Bullock Museum in Austin serves as Texas' state history museum. They are currently renovating the petroleum section of the museum. The mission of the new exhibit area is to tell the story of Texans at the forefront of the

oil and gas industry and how that industry fuels our world. The Petroleum Museum is proud to be working with the Bullock to identify objects from our Museum that will help tell that story. The Bullock opened in 2001 as the official history museum of the State of Texas and works to engage the broadest possible audience to tell the continually unfolding Story of Texas. Being a non-collecting museum, all of the Bullock's 700+ artifacts currently on display are borrowed from other museums, private collectors, state agencies, and historical sites. Since its opening in 2001, the Bullock has displayed over 7,500 artifacts from more than 1,000 lenders including the National Archives, National Air and Space Museum, the Library of Congress and the Petroleum Museum.

With the Petroleum Museum's large collection of oil and gas artifacts, representatives from the Bullock have already made several visits to obtain a better understanding of the industry and our collection. As they craft the story their museum wants to tell, the Petroleum Museum will be here to help bring that story to life.

Minerals Fluorite with Quartz

This large stunning specimen is currently on loan to the Petroleum Museum from James Gibbs, Dallas. The green fluorite, combined with quartz, is a beautiful example of fluorites from the Taolin Mine in southeastern China. This mine contains one of the largest reserves of fluorite in China. Fluorite comes in many colors and is known for its fluorescence under ultraviolet light. Industrially it is used as flux for smelting and in the production of certain glasses and enamels.

Quartz is the second most abundant mineral in the Earth's crust and its many varieties, some occurring as semi-precious stones, has been used since antiquity in the making of jewelry and carvings.

If you haven't been by and taken some quiet time among some of nature's most beautiful art, stop by soon to see this and many other minerals on display.




